"The Anatomy of Courage" – Bobby Warrenburg

Psalm 108

- ¹ My heart, O God, is steadfast; I will sing and make music with all my soul.
- ² Awake, harp and lyre! I will awaken the dawn.
- ³ I will praise you, Lord, among the nations; I will sing of you among the peoples.
- ⁴ For great is your love, higher than the heavens; your faithfulness reaches to the skies.
- ⁵ Be exalted, O God, above the heavens; let your glory be over all the earth.
- ⁶ Save us and help us with your right hand, that those you love may be delivered.
- ⁷ God has spoken from his sanctuary: "In triumph I will parcel out Shechem and measure off the Valley of Sukkoth.
- ⁸ Gilead is mine, Manasseh is mine; Ephraim is my helmet, Judah is my scepter.
- ⁹ Moab is my washbasin, on Edom I toss my sandal; over Philistia I shout in triumph."
- Who will bring me to the fortified city?
 Who will lead me to Edom?
- ¹¹ Is it not you, God, you who have rejected us and no longer go out with our armies?
- ¹² Give us aid against the enemy, for human help is worthless.
- ¹³ With God we will gain the victory, and he will trample down our enemies.

- 1. Look up Psalm 57 and Psalm 60 in your Bibles (or Bible apps). Compare verses with Psalm 108. What do you notice?
 - o Psalm 57 was written when David was hiding in a cave from King Saul
 - Psalm 60 was written during a military campaign when enemies attacked David's homeland
 - What does it tell you that David combined portions of these earlier "lament psalms" into this new song of praise?
- 2. The sermon opened with the children's story "There's No Such Thing as a Dragon."
 - What "dragons" in your life have you tried to ignore, hoping they'd stay small?
 - o How have you seen problems grow larger when left unaddressed?
 - What kinds of "dragons" do people commonly avoid? (relationships, health, finances, spiritual issues, etc.)

Three Sources of Courage

Source 1: Pain (verses 1-5)

- 1. How can past experiences of pain actually become sources of strength? Think of a difficult season you've walked through. How might God want to use that experience to help you or others in the future?
- 2. The sermon mentioned that David learned to "awaken the dawn" to bring light in dark situations. When have you or someone you know been able to do this?
- 3. The sermon described canal locks that lift boats over walls they can't go around.
 - o What "walls" have you encountered that seemed impossible to overcome?
 - o How have you seen God provide a way when there seemed to be no way?

Source 2: Praise (verses 5-6)

"Courage is when you're more concerned about something else's greatness and supremacy than you are about your own greatness, supremacy, and exaltation."

- 4. What does it mean practically to "exalt God above the heavens"?
- 5. What person, cause, or principle would you be willing to take risks for? What does this reveal about your values?
- 6. How does caring about God's reputation and "those He loves" shift our perspective on our own challenges?

Source 3: Promises (verses 7-13)

- 7. Verse 7 says "God has spoken from his sanctuary." What promises from Scripture have anchored you during difficult times?
- 8. Look at the specific promises David references. What was God promising Israel, and why was this important for their courage?

- 9. The sermon mentioned specific promises like "My God will cause all grace to abound" and "When you pass through the waters, I will be with you." What biblical promises do you need to remember more often?
- 10. Take a few minutes to consider:
 - What "dragon" in your life needs to be acknowledged rather than ignored?
 - Which of the three sources of courage (pain transformed, praise focus, promises remembered) do you most need to develop?
 - o What is one specific promise from God's Word you need to hold onto right now?
- 11. How can we help each other develop steadfast hearts?
- 12. What would it look like for our group to be people who "awaken the dawn" who bring hope and light to dark situations?
